MATH 254 – Introduction to Ordinary Differential Equations Section 9H MWF 12:00 – 12:50 Fall 2016

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**Text:** Fundamentals of Differential Equations, UA Custom Edition by Nagle, Saff, and Snider. (The UA custom edition is based on the eighth edition of the text.)

**Course Objectives:** Math 254 is an introduction to ordinary differential equations. Students who complete the course will be able to solve linear differential equations (both scalar equations and systems of equations) exactly and approximately using a variety of techniques.

**Attendance:** Students are expected to attend every scheduled class, and are responsible for material covered in their absence (excused or otherwise).

**Classroom Behavior:** To foster a positive learning environment, students and instructors have a shared responsibility. **Homework:** (25%) Written homework will be assigned on a weekly basis. Your solutions to homework assignments should be written or typed clearly, with all steps shown and clearly explained. Homework must be turned in by the specified due date; late homework will not be accepted unless you obtain prior permission from the instructor. You are encouraged to work together on homework in groups, but the final write-up must be your own.

**Calculators and other devices:** Calculators and other electronic devices (including but not restricted to laptops, cell phones, and tablets) are **NOT** allowed on in-class exams or the final.

**In-Class Exams:** (39%, 13 each) Three in-class exams are *tentatively* scheduled for Wednesday, September 14; Monday, October 10; and Friday, November 4. Each exam will be worth 100 points. *All electronic devices must be turned off during all exams.* 

In general, there will be no make-up exams in the course. However, in complex and unusual circumstances which are beyond your control, a make-up exam may be given on a case-by-case basis. This will require providing a detailed account of the situation and supporting documents. Approval in these cases is at the sole discretion of the instructor and/or the dean of students. According to university policy, no exams will be held on the week of December 5.

**Final Exam:** (36%) The final exam is a comprehensive exam. It is scheduled for Thursday, December 15 from 10:30 – 12:30 am.
